Dear Father

On opening
your letter I found en-

my letter. Certainly
write her a long one
just before I left
home and don't know

my last letter from

see me the other day
and invited me over
to spend the day and
drive around the marsh.
himself very pleasant
indeed. I made all

necessary excuse for his
wife. Orie Grathen
came around Thursday
and took me to see
Mrs Boon, but when
we got there they were
all starting out for a
drive so we did not
see them long. Mr Boon
expected to leave the
next day for Durham
so we just exchanged

sent messages and then

me to stop with her but

is going home on the
16th and will be company
for me all the way. I
