I have been
wanting to write you ever
since you left home but
have been busy trying to
get the boy in school dresses
before moving and going
through with as many
"performances" I could not
think of writing. We are
now living in the out room
while our house is being
moved over on the lawn
the kitchen was moved
several days ago and are

caring the house over
this morning, you have
never seen things come
up as in your life. But
hope to be well again
by Monday. I am writing
under disadvantages today to
specially to tell you that
your grand son has two
teeth - I discovered one yester-
day and the other today. He was
ill Monday & Tuesday had
the Dr. to see him several times
a day, had a scorching fever
but is all right now since having
his gums lanced and perfectly
well now, and as frisky as

ever you would enjoy seeing
him in short dressed he is
so cuti for any thing, his
Grandpa send him a letter
today all the way from
Daratoga Spring and he
is just as proud of it as
can be, I'm a day a little
longer miss you as much
he sometimes give for you
and will laugh with delight
as well as the rest of us
to see you, We all miss
you more than you can im-
agine, in fact when we go
down home it seems very
little like home without

though they are all glad
to see us and as kind
