RULES AND REGULATIONS
TO GOVERN THE
TEACHERS AND PUPILS OF THE DURHAM
GRADED AND HIGH SCHOOL.,

THE SCHOOL.

1. The Durham Graded and High School, shall be free to the children of all permanent white residents of the town, between the ages of six and twenty-one years; and all white children who have no parents, but are themselves permanent residents of the town, shall be entitled to the same privilege, provided that the children of non-residents and persons over 21 may also be admitted, on payment to the Treasurer of the Board, semi-annually[sic] in advance, of such fee for tuition as the Board may prescribe.
2. The scholastic year shall commence on the first Monday in September and continue for 38 weeks, exclusive of Christmas week.
3. There shall be one daily session, continuing five hours; time of opening and closing to be arranged by the Superintendent: said session to be divided equally, allowing one recess of 30 minutes for the higher grades, and two recesses of 20 minutes each for the lower grades, during which time no one shall leave the School enclosure without permission of the teacher in charge of the class at the time of the recess, or of the Superintendent. Other recesses may be granted in the primary grades at the option of the Superintendent.
4. The following days shall be holidays: State Thanksgiving Days.
5. No paying pupils are to be admitted into the school except upon prepayment to the Treasurer of tuition for not less than half a session, or the unexpired part thereof, and no deduction shall be made for those who leave before the expiration of the session, unless specially allowed by the Board.
6. A prompt attendance at the opening of the scholastic year is of the utmost importance to the progress of the pupils and to the proper organization of the classes.
7. Promotion from one division to a higher shall be made annually, upon strict examination by the Superintendent[sic], under the direction of the Board of Trustees. Special promotions may

be made at any time by the Superintendent, when the interest of the pupil and of the school require it.

8. The government of the school shall be mild but firm. Pupils misbehaving or derelict in studies may be kept in after school hours, not exceeding one hour, and in aggravated cases corporal punishment may be resorted to. All cases where corporal punishment is considered necessary shall be referred to the Superintendent, and if in his judgement [sic] such punishment is necessary it shall be administered in his presence.

9. Unruly pupils and all guilty of gross misconduct shall be suspended from school, the time of suspension to be fixed by the Superintendent and approved by the Trustees. Parents of pupils having complaints to make are requested to make same to the Board or Superintendent.

10. Monthly reports will be furnished to parents, giving the number of days attendance, deportment, progress in scholarship, punctuality, &c. Reports must be returned promptly to the teachers, properly endorsed by the parent.

11. The names of all pupils who have obtained as high a record in attendance, deportment and scholarship, as 95 per cent, of the maximum, in each case, shall be placed upon the monthly Roll of Honor, to be filed by the Superintendent among the records of the school; and the names be kept conspicuously in the school room until the succeeding report.

12. Written examinations in all the grades above the primary shall be held at least every eighth week. Examination for grading shall take place during the last week of the term.

13. The standard for admission to any grade, shall be an average of 70 on the annual written examinations, and on the recitations of the previous year, and 75 where the grade is to be fixed by written examinations, the standard of perfection being 100.

14. The school bell will ring for five minutes, every school day, at 8 o'clock, a. m., to notify pupils that the doors are open; and exercises will begin promptly at 8:30—excepting from Oct. 15th, to March 15th, both inclusive, when the bell will ring at 8:30, a.m., and exercises begin at 9 o'clock.

15. No pupil shall be enrolled in the School who fails to procure the required text books and who does not present the proper certificate from the Auditor to the Superintendent.

16. The following tuition will be charged non-resident pupils, or those over 21 years old: Primary Department, \$10, per scholastic year of 38 weeks; Intermediate Department, \$15; High

School \$20, payable half in advance, other half at beginning of second half of session.

17. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine all accounts and salaries, see that they are correct, and make sight draft payable to order upon the Treasurer with bill attached for amount.

18. The Auditor shall enter upon the stub of his draft book, amount paid to whom, and for what purpose.

19. The Auditor of the Board shall furnish all patrons of the school, blank forms upon which they shall make application to enter their children in the school. The parents shall fill out said blanks, stating the name and age of the child, and the name, residence, and post office address of the parent, and shall return the same to the Auditor, who, upon the receipt of said application shall examine the same and shall give to the pupil or applicant a written statement addressed to the Superintendent advising him whether said pupil is entitled to admission free or as a pay-pupil.

20. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to examine all pay-pupils and give them a statement addressed to the Treasurer showing what grades they are prepared to enter and upon the receipt of said statement, together with the required tuition, the Treasurer shall notify the Superintendent that the pupil is entitled to enrollment in the school. The Superintendent shall turn over such certificates to the Auditor.

21. It shall be the duty of all persons who may be authorized to make purchases or to have labor performed for the benefit of the school, to certify to the correctness of accounts for same.

SUPERINTENDENT

1. The Superintendent shall, under the advice and direction of the Board of Trustees, have the general supervision of the school.

2. He shall have charge of the buildings, furniture, and fixtures; and see that the buildings, grounds, fences, outhouses, and other property of the school, are kept in good order and condition, and protected from unnecessary damage; and that each department is properly warmed and ventilated and supplied with water. To perform these duties he shall employ a janitor, at such salary as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees.

3. He shall visit and examine the different departments as often [sic] as his duties will permit, to ascertain their condition and progress. It shall be his duty to report promptly to the Board any incompetency, inattention to duty, or insubordination, on the part of any teacher.

4. He shall hold Teachers' Meetings at least once a month, during the entire scholastic year; and at such other times as he may select.
5. He shall see that the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees are uniformly observed and executed throughout the departments, and that Registers are properly kept and reports correctly made by the teachers.
6. He shall keep a record of that absence and tardiness of teachers, and report the same, monthly, to the Board. It shall be his duty to report to the Board when, in his judgement [sic], the connection of any teacher with the school shall cease to be beneficial. He shall also make a report in writing to the Board annually.
7. He shall be charged with the duty of examining and certifying the qualifications of all applicants for positions as teachers.
8. He may, under the direction and with the assent of the President, in case a vacancy occurs in the corps of teachers, employ a teacher to fill the same, until action is had by the Board, and all such vacancies he shall report to the Board at its next regular meeting.
9. He shall have charge of all text books purchased for the use of teachers or otherwise, and shall keep a correct list of the same.
10. He shall devise or adopt a system of blanks for registers and reports, see to their distribution among the teachers, fix rules for keeping them and see that they are properly kept and returned by the teachers.
11. At each regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, he shall submit a monthly report, containing an abstract of the monthly reports of the teachers, a record of the attendance of the teachers, and such other statistics and information in regard to the condition of the school as he may deem advisable.
12. Any changes in regard to the method or manner of instruction he may desire to introduce, may be presented by him in writing to the teachers, a copy of the same being kept by himself, and such directions shall be obligatory on the teachers until modified by the Board.
13. The superintendent is vested with authority to carry into effect the rules and orders of the Board of Trustees, and it is made his express duty to enforce their observance.
14. He shall keep a record of the attendance of himself and teachers, noting the absence and tardiness of the delinquent ones

at thirty minutes before the opening of school, and shall report the same monthly to the Board.

15. He shall see that the pupils are sent home immediately after school, and that the neighborhood is not disturbed by them, either during school hours or in going to school or returning therefrom.

16. He shall see that the records of the school are neatly and accurately kept by the several teachers.

17. He shall, at the close of the school year, collect and return to his office all daily and annual registers and class books.

18. For the purpose of having uniform time in all the rooms, the Superintendent shall, daily, adjust the clocks of the school with the regulator.

19. He shall see that the premises are never left, during school hours, without the presence and charge of himself or some one of the teachers.

TEACHERS.

1. They shall be in the building thirty minutes before the time of opening the school each session, and at the ringing of the City School bell shall, at once, take their respective posts of duty, and, when tardy, report their arrival to the Superintendent at his room.

2. No teacher will be permitted to promulgate partisan or sectarian views in the school

3. Teachers shall open and close school punctually, with liberty to detain only those pupils delinquent in study or deportment.

4. They shall require and maintain thorough discipline, and adhere strictly to the prescribed course of study and text books, and devote themselves during school hours exclusively to the duties of their profession.

5. At the opening of the school each teacher shall prepare a written programme for daily recitations and exercises, and place it in a conspicuous place. It must be approved by the Superintendent and strictly adhered to by the teacher in charge of the room.

6. It shall be the duty of every teacher in the school to keep, subject to inspection of the Board, an alphabetical list of the name and street of every pupil, with name of parent or guardian.

7. Every teacher shall keep, in a register furnished for the

purpose, a correct account of name, age, attendance, deportment, and scholarship of each pupil, and shall send, monthly, a report of the three latter to the parent or guardian, to be returned to the teacher.

8. When a teacher is detained from school by sickness or other necessary cause, information of such necessary detention shall be sent to the Superintendent as soon as possible.

9. They shall be responsible for the neat appearance of the school room and pupils, enjoining upon the latter cleanliness of person and dress, and shall prohibit the use of tobacco, in any form, within the school enclosure, and the chewing of anything within the rooms.

10. They shall be careful to avoid any loud or boisterous talking or laughing in the halls or school rooms, and suffer no gathering of pupils in the halls at any time.

11. They shall make and deliver to the Superintendent, on, or before the first Monday of each school month, a report of the attendance, punctuality, deportment, and scholarship of the pupils under their charge, and within two days after the close of the school year, they shall have prepared and shall return to the Superintendent, an annual report, such as he may prescribe.

12. They shall keep a list of all books furnished them for their own use. Or that of indigent pupils in their respective rooms, and of the pupils to whom they are loaned; and shall see that they are returned at the close of the school year, or sooner, into the hands of the Superintendent.

13. Teachers will not be allowed to make any reply to complaints or inquiries addressed to them by patrons, in relation to their school matters, but will refer all such communications, whether written or verbal to the Superintendent for adjustment, who in case of failure to settle shall refer to the Board.

PUPILS

1. Excuses for absence or tardiness, and requests for dismissal before the close of the school, must be made to Superintendent in writing by the parent or guardian.

2. Pupils are expected to abstain from everything that would dishonor themselves, their parents, or the school.

3. Pupils are required to be punctual and regular in attendance; to devote their time to the proper duties of the school room; to conform to the rules of the school; to obey promptly and faithfully all directions of teachers, and to be respectful to them.

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4. Pupils on their way to and from school, are strictly required to conduct themselves with proper decorum, and to refrain from loitering by the way.
 5. Any pupil in the Primary grades who shall be absent or tardy *four times* in four successive weeks, and any pupil above the Primary grades who shall be absent or tardy *three times* in the same length of time, except in case of sickness, shall be suspended from attendance at school at the option of the Superintendent. Such suspension to remain in force until satisfactory assurance is given that attendance will be punctual in the future. The Superintendent may reinstate a pupil who has forfeited his seat, but in case of a second forfeiture he can be readmitted only by special order of the Board. Absences that occur when attendance at school would endanger the health of the pupil, shall be regarded as absence occasioned by sickness.
 6. Any pupil who shall leave School at recess, or at any time before the regular hour for closing, without the consent of his teacher or Superintendent, shall not be permitted to re-enter his class without written permission from the Board, unless he can render an excuse or apology satisfactory to the Superintendent.
 7. Pupils must walk quietly through the halls and up and down stairs, and not remain in the halls or stairways, at any time when their school rooms are open. They must refrain from all conversation in the halls or stairways, and not go into rooms belonging to other grades without permission from a teacher.
 8. Pupils must not throw stones or missiles of any kind, upon the school grounds or in the streets. They must go directly to and from school without loitering by the way, and must not collect on the streets or in the vicinity of the School building before the ringing of the School bell.
 9. Any pupil marring, defacing, or in any way injuring anything connected with the school property, shall pay the value thereof as estimated by the Superintendent, or it may be referred to the Board.
 10. Pupils are strictly enjoined to avoid falsehood, profanity, and all indecent language, and to conduct themselves in an orderly and decent manner, both in school and out.
 11. Should the example and the influence of a pupil become very injurious, and his reformation appear hopeless, his parents or guardian will be required to withdraw him from school.
 12. The High School is expected to set an example to the other public schools; and its pupils must unite with its instructors to secure that degree of eminence that shall make it excel in point of regularity of attendance, studiousness, creditable recitations

good order, and mannerly deportment generally; and any pupil whose negligence in study or course of conduct is such as to impair the standing of this department, may be reported to his or her parents; after which, if there be no improvement, such pupil may be dismissed from school.

13. These and other special rules that may be announced from time to time by the Superintendent and teachers, must be carefully obeyed; and any pupil who repeatedly violates them or shows a disregard for the morals of good society, so that his conduct is injurious to his associates, will not be allowed the privilege of the school.

14. Any child who shall be guilty of falsely maligning his or her teacher, by charges of cruel treatment, without foundation, shall be suspended or expelled from school.

15. Scholarship, as shown by the monthly examinations, shall be the only test of merit in awarding the honors.

16. No member of the graduation class shall be considered in the contest for class honors, unless he or she shall have stood eight monthly examinations during the year.

17. No pupil shall be admitted to the Primary grade after the middle of the third month of each term, unless such pupil can be classified with those already belonging to such grade.

18. Diplomas will be issued to those who complete the prescribed course with credit. Certificates of Distinction will be awarded at the close of each session, for superior scholarship in the several departments. The standard of scholarship being not less than 85 per cent.

19. As the normal feature obtains in the High School, pupils of the Senior Class, who are preparing for the teachers profession, will be required occasionally to assist as teachers in the lower schools. Opportunity also will be allowed them for observing the *practice* of the theory of teaching and methods in said schools, by the regular teachers.

20. Graduates of the High School may return and pursue therein any study at pleasure: but they will not be allowed to contest for the prizes and honors, and the teachers will not be required to keep a record of their attendance and scholarship; *provided, however*, that such pupils shall comply with all the regulations of the school and be subject to its authorities.

21. No undergraduates will be allowed to take other than the regular course.
